**Leverich, James H., and Charles P. Leverich.**  
**Letters, 1836-1850.**

Letters of James H. Leverich, New York:

1836, Dec. 30, from Jackson & Riddle, Philadelphia; and transcript. Regarding the charter of two vessels for Bayou Teche, La., and Mobile.

1839, Sept. 13, to Henry S. Leverich, New York; and transcript. Regarding the purchase of dahlias and other flowers.

1843, Oct. 25, from Washington Jackson and Co., New Orleans; and transcript. Regarding the shipment of 24 bales of cotton.

1844, Feb. 1, from Wash. Jackson & Co., New Orleans. "...Our Cotton Market very quiet at about 3/8th decline..."

1844, May 14, from his brother, Charles P. Leverich, New Orleans; and transcript of page 1 only. Regarding cotton sales; "it is excessingely hot & Dry. Corn & Cotton suffering..."

Letters to Charles P. Leverich, New York:

1845, Jan. 1 (?), from W. B. Page, Philadelphia.

1847, Feb. 22, from M. B. Mahony & Co., Philadelphia, regarding Dr. Duncan's account.

1849, May 2, from Wash. Jackson & Co., New Orleans. "...the cotton market has declined..."

1850, July 17, from W. Jackson & Co.
