A HEALTHY REPORT

Saturday, October 17 was the Women's Health Fair, 1981. It was held at the Wesley Foundation, Urbana. The fair was very well organized and I found it very informative. I was disappointed, however, in the amount of women who attended, approximately 35-40 were registered. It was a rainy Saturday, but it really bothers me when you know how much time and energy goes into planning an event like this and women in the community don't take advantage of it.

There were approximately 24 booths set up covering a variety of health issues. They ranged from smoking to breast cancer to health foods. There were workshops scheduled from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. I attended two of them. Mary Ellen Shanesey spoke on "Lesbian Health Care Issues". She brought up the difficulties lesbian women have with the medical profession. The option to identify ones sexual preference was one mentioned. The questions on forms and in interviews are structured so as to exclude anything outside of heterosexuality. A was that lesbian women are the healthiest reproductively of all women and have a much lower percentage rate of venereal disease and sexual dysfunctioning. I also attended a workshop led by Dr. Barbara Bremer, psychologist on "Finding the Right Professional Mental Health Counseling". Dr. Bremer discussed the variety of professionals in the field and questions to ask of a professional you may seek. She felt that one should:

- 1. Ask the fee for the service.
- 2. Ask for the name of the degrees they hold.
 - 3. What experience they have.
- 4. What specific training or model did they use.

These were a few of the suggestions. I enjoyed myself and want to give special praise to the YWCA and expecially Lisa Cunningham.

SELF-DEFENSE

Self defense for practical street attacks will be offered by Mike Berger (Graduate student at the University of Illinois, Black Belt, registered with the United States Karate Association. Styles Studied: Tae Kwon Do (Korean) & Chinese Kempo. The techniques involved with this course are all concerned with the martial arts. Techniques will be selected with respect to defense against attack situations. The course is not intended as an "end-all" but rather is intended to give women an extra tool for warding off dangerous situations. The course is also intended to instill a degree of confidence into the student but by no means over confidence. The course will run six weeks beginning Monday, November 2, and will be held Monday and Thursday evenings from 7-8 p.m. with a second hour option for an informal review/work period from 8-9, at the McKinley Foundation (Knox- Calvin Room) located at the corner of 5th & Daniel in Champaign. HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO W.I.R.E.

November 1st marks the fifth year anniversary of W.I.R.E., the Women's Information and Resource Exchange.

W.I.R.E. was conceived as the result of a Women's Congress held in April 1976, where women from the community and representatives from various organizations and agencies serving women in Champaign-Urbana came together to discuss the needs of the women's community. The Baker Fund of the Wesley Foundation, which has a commitment to ministry with women, provided the money to begin, and with the laborious efforts of a few key people W.I.R.E. was born.

Since 1976 W.I.R.E. has grown and expanded to include the publication of a free monthly Women's Community Newsletter and has been able to hire a quarter time coordinator to provide some continuity to the office. W.I.R.E. has been fortunate to have a social work intern from the U of I to help in her growth and has the continued support and encouragement of the Baker Board and staff at the Wesley Foundation.

W.I.R.E. received her first call on October 26, 1976 and has now received over 3,000 calls. W.I.R.E. is currently staffed by coordinator Suzanne Worner, social work intern Cindy Dunn, and dedicated volunteers: Nicky Keyes, Rosalind Weber, Cher Levenson, Lora Hall, Karen Roberts, Nancy Metzer, Laura Faynor, Lisa Remis, Jeanette Sey, Karen Hafley, Diane Schuyler, who all work to keep W.I.R.E. running smoothly. Special thanks to Julie Abell, Wesley Foundation secretary who is never too busy to help W.I.R.E. and Mark Peterson, who contributes his time and energy.

WIFE ABUSE/A POWER STRUGGLE

According to 140 researchers who met in July at the University of New Hampshire a new pattern of domestic violence has been found. Based on extensive research reported at the meeting, the end to most severe wife beating incidents seems to be in sight.

The findings of Dr. Mildred D. Pagelow of California State University, at Fullerton, are based on interviews and case studies that indicate that wife abuse may be decreasing as women attain the resources of education, employability, and earning. These are the women who are willing to leave their battering spouses. These are women who will no longer legitamize the man's battering behaviors because they have obtained some power over their lives. They have attained status.

WE ARE THE MAJORITY

Five polls concerning abortion were done during May & June of this year. The results of these polls are as follows:

ABC Poll
Q: Do you tend to agree or disagree with this statement: Generally speaking, a woman should be able to get an abortion if she decides she wants one no matter what the reason?

Approve abortion no matter what the 40% reason

Approve abortion in most circumstances 34% Disapprove in most circumstances 16% Disapprove in all circumstances 10%

GALLUP Poll

Q: The US Supreme Court has ruled that a woman may go to a doctor to end pregnancy at any time during the first 3 months of pregnancy. Do you favor or oppose this ruling?

Favor 45% Oppose 46% No Opinion 9%

HARRIS Poll

Q: Should any woman who is three months or less pregnant have the right to decide, with her doctor's advice whether or not she wants to have an abortion?

A. Yes 68% No 30%

NBC Poll

Q: Agree or disagree: Decision to have an abortion should be left to the woman and physician:

Agree 75% Disagree 21% Not Sure 4%

CBS Poll

Q: If a woman wants to have an abortion, and her doctor agrees to it, should she be allowed to have an abortion or not?

Clearly, most voters are Pro-Choice. The reason the Pro-Choice majority hasn't had more impact on Congress is that Congress counts votes, letters and campaign workers -- not opinion polls.

Legislators will hold the Iine against the political maneuvers of the antiabortion minority only when they know they can count on pro-choice voters, letter writers, and campaign workers. That's what will defeat the threats of laws and amendments to make abortion illegal.

YOU MUST BE VISIBLE, VOCAL AND VOTING

SUPPORT SUSAN CATANIA

Susan Catania (R) has been the chair person for the past seven years to the Commission on the Status of Women. Ms. Catania's hard work has sponsored and passed most of the important legislation for women during that time as chair. For example, legislation on domestic violence, teenage pregnancy and concern for elderly women are just a few areas she has worked on.

Ms. Catania has been targeted by the speaker of the house, George Ryan (R), in an act of retaliation over her concerted effort on the passage of the ERA and her work to change the 3/5 ruling. As a part of that retaliation, Mr. Ryan has not re-appointed Ms. Catania to the Commission on the Status of Women. Mr. Ryan has not allowed any discussion about changing the 3/5 rule. Illinois happens to be the only state in the Union that requires a 3/5 majority for passage of an amendment to the U.S. constitution. This is crucial to the passage of the ERA.

There are rumors that Ms. Catania will run for Lieutenant Governor of Illinois. She will be running against Governor Thompson's chosen candidate none other than George Ryan.

CAN YOU BE A MENTOR

You could be a participant in the University of Illinois YWCA Mentoring Program, which is designed to match students with career minded women. The YWCA students have founded this program and hope you will share your experience and know-how with a young woman who is planning her career.

We are asking you to volunteer to spend half an hour with a student discussing your career. For example, the students may be interested in how you chose your career; what problems you faced, and/or are still facing as a woman; and how your educational background prepared you for this career.

A mentor will fill out an application and a student will fill out an application and we will carefully match students (mentees) with their prospective mentor.

In the event of a match, we will contact you and request your approval.

Upon approval, the student will be given your name and business phone number. It will be the responsibility of the student to contact you and set up a meeting date. When the student arrives, she will have a calling card which includes a brief evaluation form to be returned to us.

Remember, you will be volunteering for no more than one half hour. If you wish to meet with the student again, please feel free to arrange further meetings yourself. However, if the student wants to meet again, the YWCA will once again contact you for your approval.
