Current Endowed Support

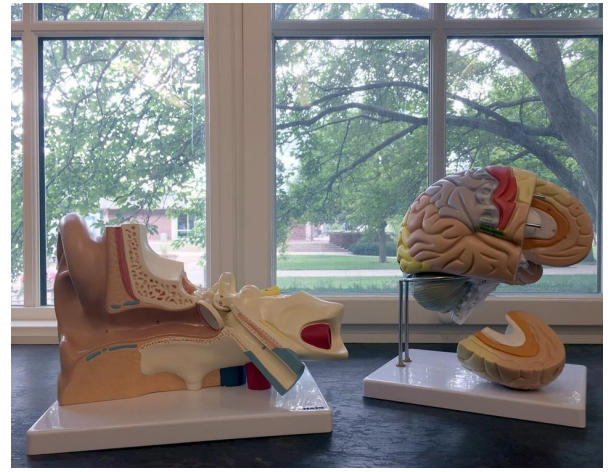

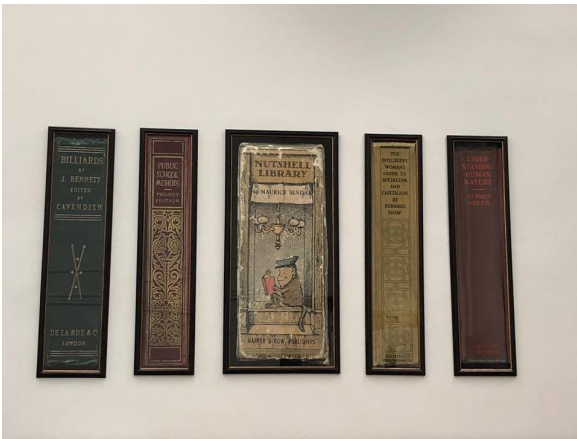
Check These Out! New Additions at SSHEL

SSHEL has had some unique and exciting new additions to our collection! This summer, we acquired oversized scientific models of the human brain and ear, which are available for patrons to check out from SSHEL South. The ear is scaled to about five times life-size, to allow for observation of all the structures that help the ear to hear. The brain, at about twice regular life-size, is labeled and color-coded to indicate its different functional centers and emphasize the differences



between its right and left hemispheres.

SSHEL has also added some more new art to the walls of SSHEL North. In Room 104, patrons can now view prints of old book spines reflecting just a few of the many subjects covered by our library. Sports and leisure, education, children's literature, women's studies, economics, and psychology are all showcased in these new artworks.

\$190 to purchase *Sexually Transmitted Disease: An Encyclopedia of Diseases, Prevention, Treatment, and Issues*. This 2-volume set features an alphabetical list of more than 230 entries, a guide to related topics, and a timeline of STDs. Case studies, illustrations, and informative insets and tables support the text.

\$200 - \$800 to cover the cost of purchasing two human skull models with facial muscles and two without. Anatomical models are a critical part of hands-on learning for Speech and Hearing Science students. Duplicates will help to make the models more readily available for students to check out. \$600 will purchase two skull models with facial muscles. \$200 will purchase two skull models without facial muscles.
